If yes, give a brief descripiton and a list of modules currently operational (maximum 500 words)	The college has been using College Automation software since 2009. It includes all student related parameters i.e. no. of student, caste wise student list, total, malefemale, list of PG students caste wise etc. Automatic Attendance System for teaching and nonteaching staff with face recognition machine is successfully operative since 2010. For financial transaction an Accounting software was introduced in 2013 by a vendor namely Pacific Technologies based in Guwahati. Online payments of admission fees for students have already been introduced in 2017 and is continuing smoothly. The Library management information system was based on SOUL software. Works pertaining to data entry this platform was done by the library staff, where books searching, issue and return were openly accessible to both student and faculty members. However due to some technical fault, the Soul software is temporarily non functioning, there is a provision for feedback from students in the institutional website. Online grievance redress mechanism is another management aspect in the web site. There are departmental admins to enter details of departmental activities, events and departmental activities, events and approval by he technical expert attached with IQAC.

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Dimoria college , Khetri, has the following mechanism for effective delivery of curriculam. i. At the very beginning of the academic session, departmental meetings are organized in each department in which the topics of the syllabus are distributed to the teachers. ii. Number of classes for each topic is decided according to the syllabus and credits assigned to each topic/group/paper etc. iii. A weekly/ schedule/ time table / class routine is provided by the college administration for each semester for both UG and PG classes. iv. The Departmental heads again redesigned the central routine without changing the time schedule includes the names of different teachers for different classes of their respective departments. The departmental routine is again approved from the Principal of the college. v. Teachers are asked to prepare their lectures according to the syllabus allotted and classes available. vi. Classes are held under strict supervision of the college administration. vii. The library of the college provides the necessary books and journals to the teachers. Apart from the central library there are departmental library which are also used by the teachers for making lesson plan and essential notes. A good number of Journals are subscribed by the college. Inflibnet(e-bookande-journals) facility is available for teachers and also for the students. viii. There are considerable numbers of smart class rooms apart from over head projectors and other gadgets such as scanners for the effective delivery of the curriculum. ix. Various classroom teaching methods a per the requirement of different subjects are regularly practiced, following are the important to be mentioned: a. Chalk and black board method. b. ICT enabled teaching learning method. c. Use of different software. d. Use of scientific models and charts for effective lecture delivery. e. Distribution of class notes by teachers. f. Group discussions among the students during the class. g. Micro-teachings and seminars by students. h. Paper presentation by the students. i. Adequate numbers of instruments, gadgets, models are supplied to the students for their practical work. j. Need based survey programmes, field works and educational excursions are carried by the departments. k. Project work, dissertations are conducted for fulfilment of their degrees. 1. The departments of the college arrange regular talks, seminars, etc for the benefits of te students. m. Apart from all these mentioned above the departments of the college organize regular class test, mid- term examinations, internal assessment, viva- voce, for the benefit of the students. Remedial and tutorial classes are also conducted based on requirement. Departments keep the records of the classes, assessment, project report etc. college administration specially the academic committee keeps a vigilant eye on the results, departmental proceedings and student needs and keeps records of the different activities of the college regarding teaching- learning, development and improvements of different methods for effective curriculum delivery.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

There is a system of obtaining Feedback from various stakeholders both students and guardian during the current assessment year. Students Feedback was taken in the offline mode on a single day in the entire departments. The data sheets generated, was handed over to an external agency for data analyses and the feedback report provided in two sections. The principal of the college provides the feedback scores to each and every faculty members of every department and other stakeholders like library and office staff individually by the Principal

in a standard format designed by IQAC. In the second phase, feedback of the guardians was taken from every department in the offline mode. The opinions and suggestions advocated by the guardians were studied by the IQAC and a list of grievances prepared. The issues raised were discussed in the IQAC Core Committee meetings for seeking possible remedial measures. Some issues like change of contract for canteen and change of administrative procedures were sent to the Governing Body for appropriate approval. The IQAC has requested the principal on different occasions to redress various pertinent grievances raised during the stakeholder feedback process. The college has decided to constitute a Guardians' Forum in the college, the first of its kind in the State at college level, with a view to involve the guardians in the overall qualitative improvement of the institutional ambience as well as to narrow down the shortcomings of the feedback. This forum along with the forum of retired teachers/ principals of the college and the alumni association has been brought into a common/joint platform for further involvement in the redress of certain grievances. These stakeholder groups will also be involved with IQAC in order to improve the decision making processes. The administration also takes heed of non formal feedback from the various stakeholders blended with individual jurisprudence on the part of the principal (as the administrative head) and the Governing Body for planning and executing various developmental works in the institution for its overall development. Informal interaction with the various stakeholders on different occasions has also led to the formation of ideas and opinions regarding developmental aspects of the institution. The parent teacher meetings held at various departments has served to elicit opinions from the guardians on various developmental aspects of the institution. The institution has a close bonding with the nearby Khetri locality (where the college is situated). The local people frequent the campus for a variety of reasons and informal interaction with different individuals of the institutional locality has become more of a routine affair. Several ideas on important developmental aspects have crystallized in that way also.

2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

There was no formal mentoring system in the college until 2018 2019 academic sessions. The same was introduced from current session i.e., 201920. Although there was no mentoring system prior to 201920 but the faculty members of the college maintain close rapport with the students (especially the students from the major course) and assist them in various aspects pertaining to their career and personal issues. Moreover, the field works that are carried on in some of the departments is a good opportunity for the students and the faculty members for developing good personal bonds as good period of time is spent together during travelling and overnight stays in outstation places. There is a close bonding between the teachers and the taught also gets developed through a variety of co curricular and extracurricular activities in different departments, e.g. departmental functions (freshmen social and farewell functions), publication of departmental wall magazines and newsletters, activities of student societies, etc. in this process, faculty members get to know about their personal traits and also the opportunity to perform the role as their informal mentors. However, a few departments like physics, Geography and statistics have been implementing the formal mentoring practice, primarily for the major course students before and after the examination and admission. The Students' Counseling Cell of the college has been entrusted with the task of devising a mechanism for effectively implementing the mentoring system in consultation with the head of the departments of the college within a designated time frame. Moreover, it has been also resolved through IQAC to introduce mentoring at the institutional level through professional assistance, and supported by the Students' Counselling Cell.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college follows the guideline of the affiliating University , Gauhati university have the internal evaluation system of various courses and programmes therefore it is not possible to undertake massive reforms in the CIE system. Apart from following the guidelines of affiliating university some departments also adopt certain internal evaluation procedures like student seminars, class tests, home assignments, etc. proper care is taken so that the sessional examinations (as envisaged by the university as part of the CIE), are carried on smoothly and in a hassle free manner. A committee under the strict supervision of the principal is formed by the Principal, which is responsible for preparing a subject wise examination routine for the various academic departments. It is a normal practice to hold the examinations as per this prescribed routine, but sometimes makes slight adjustments under unwanted circumstances and as per convenience of the students. After completing the tasks of question paper setting the faculty members of the individual departments sends the hard and soft copies to the designated committee which takes the task of finalizing it in the printed form, after which the question papers are supplied back to the departments in the required quantities. The committee also undertakes the responsibility of sending blank answer script booklets in the required quantities to the individual departments well ahead of the examination schedule. The invigilation duties on the examination dates are given by the faculty members from the respective departments. The answer scripts are evaluated at the departmental level and the marks retained till the term examinations, when it has to be upload to the university web site

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

There is an academic calendar which is prepared every year by the institution for the smooth running of the academic programme of the college under the active supervision of the IQAC. This is prepared following the publication of the affiliating university's (Gauhati University) academic calendar cum holiday list. The calendar is uploaded in the institutional website and also circulated through the WhatsApp groups of students in various departments. The calendar incorporates various important events and activities planned during the academic year viz. tentative schedule of the various examinations, field visits, different in house activities/events like observance of college annual foundation day, annual college week celebration, college general freshmen social and departmental freshmen social functions, student union elections, etc., in addition to the list of various important holidays during the year.

Apart from all those mentioned above, different miscellaneous events/celebrations, mostly events that are conducted/ held at short notices or within short preparation schedules are excluded from the purview of this

Sessional examinations are conducted as per schedule as outlined in the academic calendars.
